#### Dear Peekskill Community,

This year we have focused on growing together as a school community and have stood side by side as our schools and children flourish in a supportive educational environment. The new programs introduced this school year have welcomed our eager learners, and we remain focused on increasing opportunities for our students in the 2016-2017 school year. Our motto of "Every Student; Every Day" exemplifies the philosophy that drives our academic and programmatic successes.

On April 12, 2016, a school budget totaling \$86,564,193 was adopted by the Board of Education, resulting in a budget increase of 3.48% and a tax levy increase of 1.11%. On behalf of the Board of Education, I am pleased to announce that our lobbying efforts to recover state aid resulted in a 6.6% overall increase in funding for our school district. As you peruse through this newsletter, please note the highlights from our 2016-17 Educational Plan and Budget. Thanks to our state aid increase we are able to add needed programs and enhance existing programs, which align to our Board and District goals with respect to literacy, graduation, community collaboration, safety, and fiscal management.

This summer, our staff and administrators will continue their work as School Leadership Teams. Together they will partake in professional development sessions to review data, examine grants, align curriculum and discuss best instructional approaches while designing programs to meet our learners' needs.

As we head towards the close of the 2015-2016 school year, I look forward to sharing the joy of our graduates as they set off to pursue their post high school dreams. I also look forward to the continued development of our District's growth mindset as we celebrate our work and achievements together, while adding value to our students' experiences in Peekskill schools.



In closing, I urge you to exercise your right to vote at the Annual School Board Election and Budget Vote on May 17, 2016.

### **School Board Election**

Three, three-year seats are up for election: Incumbent Michael Simpkins, Incumbent Maria Pereira and Incumbent Jillian Villon. Voters will elect three members to the Peekskill City School District Board of Education.

#### All Individuals Must Be Qualified to Vote

A qualified voter is a person who is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, and a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

#### When and Where to VOTE

The vote on the annual budget and for school board candidates will take place on Tuesday, May 17 from 7A.M. to 9 P.M. To vote you must be registered for either the school elections or general elections. Voting will take place at Peekskill High School, 1072 Elm Street

#### **ABSENTEE BALLOTS**

The Board of Education provides for absentee ballots for the election of members of the Board of Education, the adoption of the annual budget, and propositions.

Applications for absentee ballots are available in the office of the District Clerk, 1031 Elm Street, between the hours of 8  $_{\hbox{\scriptsize A.M.}}$  and 4  $_{\hbox{\scriptsize P.M.}}$ 

Absentee ballots are available in the office of the District Clerk after April 29, 2016. Absentee ballot applications must be filled out and returned to the District Clerk by mail, or in person, by May 10, 2016. After an absentee ballot application is received by the District Clerk, an absentee ballot is mailed to your home. You are to return the absentee ballot in person to the District Clerk at the Administration Building by May 16, 2016 no later than 4 P.M. or by mail on May, 17, 2016 no later than 5 P.M. ## What does the 2016-2017 Educational Plan and Budget Support?

## DISTRICT-WIDE RESPONSE TO INTERVENTION (RTI)

Rtl is a three tiered approach to providing differentiated instruction to all learners. Targeted and scaffolded interventions are implemented in response to assessment data to support and push students' reading development. Currently, the State mandate is to implement an Rtl program K-4, yet in Peekskill, we are looking to align a support structure K-12. That support will look different at each level K-5, 6-8, and 9-12, however the emphasis is on providing supports to address students' needs in the area of literacy across all grade levels. In order to address students at all levels, a K-12 Rtl Design Team was created that worked on specific sub-components of an overarching Rtl plan. The new plan will be piloted in 2016-17.

#### AT THE ELEMENTARY LEVEL:

#### Transitional Kindergarten

In 2016-2017 PCSD will continue to support Transition Kindergarten and Transition Classrooms in Grades I and 2, producing literacy rich environments that provide a two-year opportunity for students to succeed academically. Three classes are in year two of this program. New year one classes will be created pending student identification and need. In this program, the classroom teacher "loops" with the same cohort of students. Students will learn through play-based and project-based multi-disciplinary units of study. Acceleration will be individualized and movement to the next grade will be fluid. This unique program provides time for students to catch up academically, to keep moving forward each year, and eliminates the traditional retention model.

#### **Elementary Enrichment Program**

The Elementary Enrichment program provides project-based learning experiences for all students in research, science, technology and the arts. The enrichment for all programs will be in its second year of implementation.

#### **Elementary Strings Program**

After introducing violins in the 2015-2016 school year, the Elementary Strings program continues to grow with cello and bass being introduced in 2016-2017 for students in Grades 3 and 4. The goal of a middle school and a high school orchestra will be realized over time. Students will perform at least annually in a concert or recital.

#### AT THE SECONDARY LEVEL:

#### 21st Century Electives at PKMS & PHS

Peekskill Middle School and High School will continue to add new and enriching courses for the 2016-2017 school year: Peekskill High School will be adding new courses and enhancing existing courses in the areas of STEAM, Math, English, Social Studies, Art and Music. The Middle School will look at enhancing its second year courses in STEAM and the accelerated classes.

#### Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (STEAM)

The Peekskill High School Science Department will begin to utilize Google Classroom. Many of the high school science offerings will be enhanced by the use of Chromebooks.

This year we also see the addition of Art (A) to "STEM," thus creating STEAM. This expansion acknowledges the incorporation of the artistic process in both the scientific method and engineering design. While students' final products will vary by subject, similarities regarding the investigation of ideas, problem solving, creative design, technical literacy and collaboration will encompass student projects whether in the art studio, or the science lab.

The 2016-2017 school year will see the Grade 6-12 STEAM program take a step forward as Peekskill adopts the Engineering by Design program. Using constructivist models, students participating in the program learn concepts and principles in a problem/project-based environment. Peekskill teachers in the middle school and high school will be trained this summer.

#### **Grade 9 Humanities**


In Grade 9, Peekskill High School will pilot a new interdisciplinary class between Grade 9 English and Grade 9 U.S. History. The curriculum for the class is being jointly written this spring by members of each department. This will be a two credit, team taught block course, blending themed literary works into the U.S. history curriculum.

#### **BOCES Courses for Special Education Students**



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
#### Revenue Projection 2016-17

## AHS Albany University in the High School Program

In an effort to continue providing high quality, rigorous college level courses, Peekskill High School will continue to offer courses with dual enrollment possibilities with SUNY Albany through the SUNY Albany University in the High School program. The 2015-2016 school year saw Intro into African Studies added to the high school course offering. The 2016-2017 course offerings added will be Latino Experience and Classism, Sexism, Racism as high school electives.

#### **Five Towns College**

The PHS Music Department has developed an articulation agreement with Five Towns College to offer Guitar I as a college credit offering. For students who have gone through Guitar I, PHS is proud to offer these students a second level of guitar, Guitar II.

## Bi-lingual Core Program at Peekskill Middle School

The Peekskill High School ELL program has added to its course offerings as the District continues to meet the needs of our student population while also staying in compliance with New York State Regulations. Peekskill Middle School will see changes to its ENL program as they install new bi-lingual content classes in the middle school.

#### **Middle School Acceleration**

In an effort to provide the best educational program possible for our students in Peekskill, the Middle School Acceleration program in Math and Science will move into its second year. The 2015-2016 school year saw new opportunities in Grade 6 and some modifications to the program in Grade 7.



Lander and Andy have shared a little bit about who they are and what their future holds for them after graduation.

#### 2016 Valedictorian: Lander Arpi

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
#### Peekskill Education Foundation Awards Over \$7.5K in Grants to PCSD Schools
